After a final review, the Board will vote on the acceptance of the 2017 budget and the amount of the 2017 assessment during the regular Board Meeting on October 6, 2016 at 9:00am in the main lounge.

During August, in addition to the multiple budget meetings and the regular Board meeting, there were two (2) BOD Executive Sessions, and two (2) Special BOD meetings During the August 18th special session:

It was moved and passed that having been posted for the required 30 days, the revision to the real estate open house rules of the Huntington Landmark Rules and Regulations 2010 is adopted.

MAINTENANCE

PHASE #9

WOOD AND STUCCO REPAIRS

1. Building 907 wood and stucco repairs are 100% completed. Post tension repairs are complete.
2. Building 908 wood and stucco repairs are 100% completed. Post tension repairs are complete.
3. Building 909 wood and stucco repairs are 100% completed. Post tension repairs are complete. Painting 100%
4. Building 910 wood and stucco repairs are 100% complete. Post tension repairs are complete. Painting is 100%.
5. Building 911 wood and stucco repairs are 95% complete. Post tension repairs are complete
6. Building 912 wood and stucco repairs are at 45%. Post tension repairs are at 45%
7. Building 913 wood and stucco repairs have just started and

are at 5%

We are actively working to correct the post tension issues in phase 9 based on the Engineers recommendations. The landscape contractor is utilizing the mow crew and other personnel on off mow weeks as a cost saving measure to move the sprinklers which are broadcasting on the building.

PAINTING

Buildings 901, 902, 903, 904, 905, 906, 907, 908, 909, 910 are 100% completed. Premax Painting is currently posting for painting 911. Final inspections of painting on buildings 901 thru 908 is completed

RAIN GUTTERS

Rainstoppers is currently installing the new gutters and diverters at building 901 thru 906 and should be 100% completed by 7/28/16. This work is now complete.

OTHER CONSTRUCTION

Ficaddenti Structural Engineers have received approval to draw up a repair detail for the repairs to the 310 garage foundations and the porch for 804. FWC completed the drawings and they have been presented to the contractors to review and to provide a proposal for the work.

SOLARIUMS AND SUNROOMS

The association continues to find attachment issues where sunrooms and solariums attach to the HOA's exterior envelope. This also applies to atrium coverings and lack of resident maintenance to these attachments. As part of the HOA's phase 9 building repairs residents that currently have sunrooms, solariums, atrium covers and skylights may be required to remove a portion of their installation so that the association contractor can make the necessary repairs to the exterior of the building.

POST TENSION SLABS

While the contractor was working on Phase #9 the contractor's manager found some post tension cable collars that are almost completely rusted out. Staff was able to set up a meeting with a structural engineer for an inspection and a repair. The repair methodology has been provided to management and the contractor. It has been recommended that the irrigation be moved away from the buildings immediately to prevent further erosion of the collars. O'Connell Landscape got started right away on moving the irrigation. We are actively working to correct the post tension issues in phase 9 based on the Engineers recommendations. We have also requested from staff to expedite the order to correct the sprinkler conditions. Management and O'Connell Landscape have agreed with a cost saving measure to utilize the workers they have on site for the relocation of the sprinkler heads instead of

bringing in extra labor with additional costs.

ASPHALT

2016 ASPHALT REPAIR BIDS ARE OUT: The garage areas to be done this year are Fresno Circle, Trinity Circle, Solano Circle, Yuba Circle, Modoc Circle and Plumas Circle. Trinity Circle will have the entire garage area repaved along with the addition of a new 3' wide flowline. All of the other garage areas are being repaved. The asphalt bids have been received and will be presented at the next Executive Meeting so the board can review the third party contract. At the August 4th Board Meeting the board approved the proposal from City Service Paving to complete the asphalt project in removing and replacing approx. 65,000 sq ft of damaged asphalt in 6 areas: Fresno, Trinity, Solano, Yuba, Modoc and Plumas Circle. The flowline at Trinity Circle will be removed and replaced to a wider 3' flow line. The contractor City Service Paving will be providing a start date by the end of the month and it looks like the work will start in October.

ASPHALT RESURFACING - SEAL COAT BIDS ARE OUT:

The seal coat bids have been received and reviewed by management and the MC for their recommendation to the board. At the July 7th, 2016 meeting the board awarded the seal coat meeting to City Service Paving. The schedule is as follows; Tuesday, August 23rd Larkhall, Colusa and Sierra - **NOW COMPLETE**
Tuesday, August 30th Merced, Modesto and Amador

ELECTRICAL PANELS

Parrish Electrical will be conducting inspections and repairs of the exterior electrical panels throughout 2016. Parrish Electrical will be sending out notices approximately 1 week before the work is to commence. The work is scheduled to start in August and will be done on Wednesday and Fridays. Some homeowners may experience short periods without power.
To date the contractor has completed building 1 through 14 inspections and repairs.

FUMIGATION

Newport Exterminating was awarded the fumigation contract for 2016 and they will be tenting buildings 601, 604, 606, 607, 608, 609, 611, 612, 613, 614, 615 and garages 06A, 06B, 06C, 06D, 06E, 06F, 06G, 06H, 06I, 06J.

The fumigation is scheduled for this fall. As soon as the exact dates are known the flyers will be sent to all the buildings and the off site owners. The 2016 fumigation schedule is as follows:

and garage buildings to be fumigated in 2016. The fumigation will be performed in September and October by Newport Exterminating according to the following schedule:

- a. Condos 601, 604, 606, 607 – Monday, September 19, 2016
- b. Condos 609, 611 and 612 - Monday September 26, 2016
- c. Condos 608, 613, 614 and 615 – Monday, October 17, 2016
- d. Garages on Butte Circle 06A, 06B, 06C and 06D – Monday, October 24, 2016
- e. Garages on Placer Circle 06E, 06F, 06G, 06H, 06I and 06J – Monday, October 31, 2016

TENNIS COURTS

At the July meeting the board approved the resurfacing of the tennis courts. The courts have been resurfaced and the posts will be installed as soon as the retrofit fabrication is complete. The posts have been completed and installed with the new nets. A homeowner noticed a crack on court #1, which is an expansion joint. Courts #2 and #3 have a new post tension slab and don't have an expansion joint.

The contractor has started with the site inspection, which is going to take a total of three visits to complete before they will be ready to meet with the board. Association Reserves, the contractor doing the 2017 reserve study, met with the board once after their first discovery inspection and should

RFID ACCESS CHIPS

During the month of April, May, and June, homeowners and renters have been registering their vehicles for the new access system. The RFID system went live on June 15th, and on July 17th the barcode system will no longer work. COMMUNITY Q&A

September 8, 2016

If you can't make it to the monthly Q&A meeting and have a question, feel free to email your question to: kimberly.pollard@associa.us. Kimberly will address your question at the Q&A, and it will also be printed in Landmark Living.

Q. Why is a car that can only be driven on the street, be selected over a golf cart that has access to all areas of Huntington Landmark?

A. Patrol Masters is parking the car and they are getting out and walking and they have put D-Techs, they have to go and hit those when they go around the property so they can insure us and Patrol Masters that they have hit those areas by foot.

Q. Who is paying maintenance and gas for the Patrol Masters vehicle?

A. That is in the contract. We don't pay for that.

Q. Was a car included in the Patrol Masters contract?

A. Yes

Q. Who purchased the big white tent used for Doggie Days?

A. That was generously donated by the Recyclers.

Q. How long has Huntington Landmark borrowed money from the reserves to pay for Huntington Landmark insurance?

A. This has happened for many years. We take a loan from the reserves instead of taking an outside loan that incurs interest. The operating pays 1/12 of that amount back per month. It is basically to cover our bases should there be an operating cash shortage.

Q. Should Huntington Beach police be called for stolen property or patrol masters?

A. That would be the police department. Patrol Masters has nothing to do with personal property that is stolen.

Q. Why are bike riders driving in between the gates? Do you need to show an ID to enter the community?

A. Yes, you do need to show an ID at all times, unless you're a pedestrian and you're walking in, and of course if you have your key, you would be able to gain access yourself. At this time riding bikes through the vehicle gates is prohibited and we are looking into that right now with the vehicle code laws and civil code. We are speaking with the attorney about it and there will be some new information about that coming up soon.

Q. We see dogs on the tennis courts, is this allowed?

A. A service dog is allowed anywhere on property, however they have to have ID on them and they have to be on a leash. Just because they are a service dog, which goes back to my next question, does the dog have to be on a leash? We have looked into this with the ADA regulations and services dogs have to be on a leash. As far as the tennis courts go, they can

be on the courts where the benches are in a down position and they cannot be walking around the courts or off their leash. You will receive a citation.

Q. How long has Katherine been in the management training program?

A. She started July 1st 2016 in the management training program with ASSOCIA.

Q. When will garage inspections start? And what phases will they start with?

A. It will take place in the beginning of October and I believe it will begin with Phase 11 possibly 12.

Q. How much of those last two phases of that proposal have been approved? Is that part of the 127,000?

A. In access control under the reserves it was voted on by the board there was \$130,000 in there and all that we did was the RFID and we bought the chips which were \$50,000 as of last month with the finances we got close back to \$30,000 on the RFID chips that were sold. So we are not over budget on that and we have not done anything else. We have not done the cameras, we have not done key FOBs, which has all been on hold.

Q. What is your belief that is the rule of the Finance Committee? And what was the reason that the agenda for the board meeting said that the Finance Committee did not have a report available and yet they gave the report as part of the homeowner's forum? I thought committees gave reports during the meetings.

A. As far as the committees go it is not policy for them to provide a report. Some do give reports and others don't. Some just submit their minutes. So when I put together the board packet, I include the minutes. If a committee like Landscaping, for instance, I will include that but not all committees provide minutes or reports. But the minutes will be posted on the website. Committees are not required to provide minutes or reports. Mike, Peggy, Kimberly and Katherine went down to Foothill Ranch to Speak with Colleen who does our income statements, we got the information we needed.

Q. An expensive bicycle was stolen from someone's patio this past weekend and it was recovered. Now with things like this happening do you think that it should be on the email blast?

A. We have spoken about it being on the e-blast and as of right now we have decided not to do that just based on anxiety of the residents. We don't want to upset the community.

Q. The sections for landscaping?

A. There is one located in the Main Lounge and also we can print out one for you in the Main Office.

Q. How much are we paying Able and the guy's overtime?

A. When they come in over the weekend, we don't pay them overtime, it's for them to make up the work that they missed.

That is on them, we do not pay them overtime.

Q. Does the rover go along the outline perimeter especially with the homeless?

A. The rovers are supposed to be going along those areas. We will talk to Patrol Masters to make sure that this is being done. They have a big spotlight to see what is going on but remember they are only here until 11pm. So if you hear something or see something call 911.

Q. The olives are all over the ground. They sprayed and it didn't work. Do we get our money back or how does that work?

A. They have to be sprayed at the right time. It is a hit or miss with the spray depending on when they are sprayed due to the change of the seasons and the weather conditions. If there is a tripping hazard we will send our guys over to clean it up

Q. When we are at the Beacon Pool there is a 911 phone to us in case of an emergency. But to contact the guard there isn't unless we have our cell phone. Is there anything that we can do about that?

A. We can look into trying to find a way for you to try and call the guard because it does make perfect sense because we do have a lot of problems over at the Beacon so that is something that I will definitely look into.

Q. Have we ever considered the rovers staying later? Possibly begin later?

A. That will cost you and well feel that from 8am to 11pm is a pretty good time. Other than that if you hear a noise or you see something please call 911. Don't go outside and please don't confront anybody.

Q. What is D-Tech?

A. D-Tech is a system that the security companies use. They have electric sensors around the property. They either swipe the sensor with a device that they have or push a button and this is something that the company can show that they were out patrolling, and the time and pattern that they follow each day.

Q. Meetings at 6pm?

A. Attendance at the board meetings have dropped in the past when we had this. And that's why we have moved back to the morning. The board has decided with the majority and not the minority.

Q. When do the landscaping guys have their break? Who is supervising this people?

A. They are required to take breaks. It's between them and their contractor. Able is supposed to be supervising them

Q. Do you think that some of the reasons for the landscaping problems are taking place is because O'Connell is getting rid of their more experienced and high paid workers and bring in younger people who really do not know how to treat the landscaping and breaks?

A. They are not changing the crew out, they have experienced workers. Unfortunately, some of the fellows want move on to something else and Able has to replace them. O'Connell has been great with our community for years.

Q. Does Julio speak English? He lets anyone in to the main pool area? Also does Russell with John Wayne check in?

A. Russel like every other contractor does check in the main office with Ed. Regarding Recreation, it is management as well as recreations responsibility to monitor the pool and

HUNTINGTON LANDMARK LANDSCAPE REPORT

Huntington Landmark Landscape Report
August 15 – September 15, 2016

Turf:

The mowing schedule for turf has been updated and workers are now mowing every 10 days, as weather permits.

Trees:

Due to the change in tree trimming schedule, workers now address to emergencies and branch removal as necessary. , Another list of dead trees in hazardous condition was prepared for Board approval in October. Note: Approximately 16 dead trees remain after this removal is completed.

Gardening:

The Section one rotation has been completed and rotation two is in progress. Workers are currently trimming bushes in Section 4 (Phase 3 and part of Phase 13).

Special Items:

The Atlanta and Indianapolis gate entrances were upgraded with moderate plantings of Society Garlic, Geraniums and Mulch.

Workers are removing olive tree seed pods and debris daily throughout the community to prevent hazardous conditions on sidewalks and streets. It appears that the aging Olive trees have become immune to Florel treatment and have formed an abundance of olives this year.

Ficus Trees were trimmed back at Garages by Building 516 Rear.

Spraying for weed control continues at areas where bushes

are trimmed.

Next month:

Section Rotation will continue, working at sections 4, 5, 6, and 7 in October.

Spraying for weed control will be completed at Phase 3, 5, 6,11 and13.

Special attention will continue at the Club-house, a high visibility area.

ANOTHER LITTLE LANDSCAPING LESSON

Jeanne Kerr, Landscape Liaison

Residents who have recently been tented for termite fumigation and those who will undergo this process in the future should be aware that Agapanthus (Lily of the Nile) and Day Lily plants may wilt considerably and change color following this procedure. However, residents should not be concerned since the involved plants are a hardy species and invariably will not die.

Our landscape gardeners have been instructed in these type of situations to aggressively prune these plants and allow them to continue normal growth and eventually flourish. We are aware of this condition and it is not necessary for residents whose landscaping may be affected to submit a work request. Thank you.

The differences between **Service Dogs/Emotional Support Dog** and **Therapy Dogs** are very noticeable from the perspectives of services provided and legal perspectives. The terms, ‘**Service Dog**,’ and, ‘**Therapy Dog**,’ are not meant to be used as equivalents and should not be used to mean the same thing; they are not.

According to Federal Law, a Service Animal is not a pet. The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) states that a Service Animal is any animal that has been individually trained to provide assistance or perform tasks for the benefit of a person with a physical or mental disability which substantially limits one or more of the person’s major life functions. In addition, a number of states in America have laws following Federal Law in greater detail.

In general a **Service Dog** is used by a person with a physical disability such as the blind, hearing impaired, seizures and PTSD. An **Emotional Support Dog** is a **Service Dog** for those suffering from a mental illness.

A **Therapy Dog** is one that is trained to provide comfort and affection to people in long-term care, hospitals, retirement homes, schools, mental health institutions, and other stressful situations to include disaster areas. Therapy Dogs provide people with animal contact; people who may or may not have a form of disability. Therapy Dogs work in animal-assisted activities and animal-assisted therapy. The dog is commonly owned by the person handling it, who considers the dog to be a personal pet.

Therapy Dogs often work with their handler during sessions. The Therapy Dog and its handler make visits to others in a number of settings and are the most common source of Therapy Dogs. Handlers of these dogs might be health care professionals who are members of the staff of a particular facility, or volunteers.

Service Dogs and Rights

It is very important to remember that **Therapy Dogs DO NOT** have the same rights as handlers of **Service Dogs**. Handlers of **Service Dogs** are protected under the ADA because of the disability the handler experiences. The distinction is highly-important, and there should be no misunderstanding that it is the Person with a Disability who is the handler of the **Service Dog** that has rights under the ADA; not the dog.

The **Service Dog and Emotional Support Dog** is allowed access based upon the rights of the person with a disability. The **Service Dog and Emotional Support Dog** is required to be on a leash and to wear its identifying tag at all times and the handler has to be prepared to show the identification on request. Also the handler of the **Emotional Support Dog** in addition to the dog’s ID must be prepared to show a copy of the Doctor’s letter prescribing the need for an **Emotional Support Dog**.

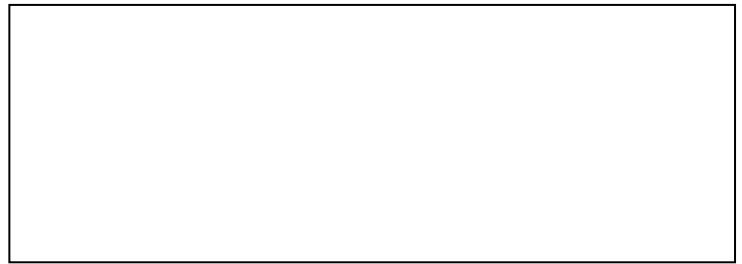
In some states, a person with a disability has the right to be accompanied by an assistance dog that is specially trained for the person without being required to pay an extra charge for the assistance dog. This is true in relation to housing as well, such as places that are for rent, lease, or other compensation within the state.

The **Service Dog** is protected by the Americans with Disabilities Act.

The **Emotional Support Dog** is protected by the Fair

Housing Ammendments Act and the Air Carrier Access Act. The **Therapy Dog** is not protected by any law or act.

Starting December 1st, 2016, to avoid confusion and continual questioning of the handlers, Huntington Landmark will implement a registration system for all Service and Emotional Support dogs. Please bring in your documentation; Service Dog Identification or Emotional Support Dog Identification and physicians prescription letter to the office where a copy will be kept on record and a unique brightly colored tag for the dog's collar will be provided. The tag will identify the dog as being a registered service, dog verified by management, security and other residents will know the dog is allowed to be with the owner throughout the community.

Owners are required to complete those applications and submit them at any time, but the deadline for earliest consideration is by close of business on the Thursdays preceding the regular ACC meetings on the first and the 3rd Tuesdays of the month.

If the change is approved by the ACC, then the owner accepts responsibility for any maintenance required by these changes. As always, the ACC truly appreciates the cooperation of all of you with the tremendous work that this takes. We are limited by our CC&R's to only 3 appointed volunteers that comprise the ACC. While there is a 45 day limit on our decision (based on CC&R's), the ACC will generally have all applications processed within just a few days of our meetings. Thank you all for your cooperation.

COOKING WITH CATHY

I like baking, but Diane doesn't eat sweets. So, I am including a few vegetables. Then, I'll get back to the sweet stuff. This is from my college days.

We four girls lived in the apartment above Steve and Pete. I'd had a mild crush on Steve since the week before my freshman year when he and his friends prank called my dorm room. I came up with the brilliant idea to have dinner with each other once a week.

Each week a different person would cook. The first time the guys cooked, I walked into their apartment. A salad bowl with a lid on it came flying at me, followed by the words, "Tossed salad!"

We tried old favorites and new experiments. I made this up. They all liked it. I have made for years since. No butter this time.

Pull out the medium skillet.

Squash

- 1 large Yellow Squash
- 2 medium Zucchini Squash
- 2 medium tomatoes
- ½ medium onion
- Lawry's Seasoned Salt - to taste
- Coarse Ground Pepper - to taste

Wash the Squash then cut off the ends. Quarter them lengthwise. Then, slice the quarters into half inch slices. Toss into skillet. Wash the tomatoes and remove stems. Cut up into bite-sized pieces. I try to get rid of the seeds, but they don't really hurt anything. Chop the onion into small pieces and toss them into the skillet, too. Stir it up. Add water to about halfway up the veggies. Sprinkle with seasonings. Bring it to a boil. Then put the lid on and lower to simmer. Let cook for

about 15 minutes. You don't want them to get mushy.

Serve with chicken, beef, pork or fish. My friend adds more water and makes it a soup. Another friend calls it my ratatouille.

If you enjoy contemporary art, check out the new American Mosaic exhibit at the Orange County Museum of Art. This exhibit will be shown until December 4th.
